





QUILT OF VALOR DAY - APRIL 21ST

We will be hosting several sites around the state for our Day of quilting. Here are the sites we have identified:

- Waverly Masonic Temple: Coordinator Irene Stocks
- Comanche Masonic Temple: Coordinator Mary Jane Young
- Des Moines Chapter, Pleasant Hill: Coordinator Sue McMain & Pat Burch
- Mt Ayr Chapter: Coordinator Kathy Shields

We are working on a day in Northwest IA also, but it will be held on an alternate date than the 21st . If you wish to hold a day of sewing in another area of the state and would like to coordinate that, please contact Pat Burch.

Several have asked how the quilts will be distributed. We want these to go to any Veteran or active duty person in your area. They need not be members of our Order or Masons. I do keep a list of requests from members but it is not necessary to be on that list in order to receive one of these quilts. Presenting them in our area would be the best!

What we Need:

- 1. If you are planning to attend one of these sites, please send the coordinator of the site a message indicating you are planning to attend. In addition, please tell them a) your skill level and b) if you will be bringing a sewing machine. This will assist in preparing for the day. Remember you do not need to be a quilter to participate. Knowing how to operate a sewing machine and sew a straight line would be fine.
- 2. We still need long armer quilters to finish the quilts once we have the tops pieced. Let us know if you are willing to quilt one or two quilts.
- 3. And finally, this all costs. The average cost of fabric is \$13/yd and depending upon the design it can cost from \$40-\$60 to cover the cost of the top of the quilt. The batting and backing that is added to it is an additional cost. If we don't have quilters who will volunteer to finish the quilts that also adds between \$60-\$90. Please consider making a donation for this project, either individually or by Chapter. All donations are to be sent to the Grand Secretary.

Why does Eastern Star need one of those? Our Order's purpose, Ritual, philanthropic projects and community service programs combined make us specialized and unique. Using effective public relations methods, we can emphasize what makes O.E.S. different and present ourselves in the best possible ways. That's called *promotion*.

There are so many ways now to "get out the word" to inform, remind and educate people about the tangible and intangible benefits of Eastern Star membership, charitable works and services and benevolent purposes.

Sometimes the most effective publicity is done one-on-one...maybe not Caitlin Clark style, but through personal references. When's the last time you shared your Masonic origin story with a new or prospective member? What caught your attention and interest? What held your interest and inspired you to take an active role in your chapter? You are Eastern Star's best walking, talking, breathing advertisement. Don't hesitate to let your light shine!



We are now entering School of Instruction season, and here's a thought about our Ritual. Did you know our District Instructors just completed their annual Ritual proficiency, instruction and examination at State School? Here in Iowa we have for years prized our Ritualistic proficiency. Truth be told now...when's the last time you recited Ritual with another member holding the book on you? Or, just to back up a bit more—when's the last time you actually read through your part in the Ritual?

One thing that sets O.E.S. apart from other community groups is our Ritual. Scripture-based and over 170 years old, the Ritual makes us unique and deserves our respect. Make a commitment now to review your Ritual wording before each meeting. Please?

Some time ago there was discussion about separating out the Ritual from our regular (business) meetings as a way to shorten our meetings and allow more time for fun and fellowship. One Eastern Star member (and a good Mason) told me afterward he hoped Eastern Star would not go this route. He said he knew of an appendant organization which did this, and it essentially lost its identity, splintered and declined. Respect the Ritual—it makes O.E.S. unique and elevates our purpose, giving us a marketing edge!

Next issue: The necessity of our Order to be willing to change in order to remain vital. Yes, that includes being willing to make changes to the Ritual.

If you're thinking "How do I purchase a new ritual?"

Chapter Secretaries order rituals from the Grand Secretary. There are green rituals available in the large spiral (\$27.00) and small hard bound (\$20.00). The cost of shipping must be included with payment. Your next chapter meeting is a great time to determine if multiple members in your chapter are interested in a new ritual as shipping costs per ritual decrease with each ritual ordered.

INTERNATIONAL HEADQUARTERS COMMITTEE UPDATE

I want to provide an update on the International Headquarters Committee so far this Triennium. The Perry Belmont House in Washington, DC., was constructed in 1909. Since 1935, it has been owned and has served as the Order Eastern Star International Headquarters. It has been beautifully maintained since 1935. These efforts include maintenance, preservation, conservation, and rehabilitation, which are necessary and ongoing, like any home. Members were asked to contribute 1 dollar per year for each year in the Triennium. I want to thank all those who have donated so far and encourage others to donate. Three (3) projects have been completed. Solar film was purchased and installed on windows on the 2nd and 4th floors for \$17,000.00 using money donated by the Grand Chapter of Pennsylvania. Last year in February, the skylight over the staircase had rotted seals. The committee was able to fund half of this cost. Rain was coming in while the heat was going out. The solar film has lowered the heating and air conditioning costs, and the skylight repair has reduced those even more. A third project was completed in January 2023, with the committee assisting with refinishing the second floor's wooden floors by giving the additional \$13,000.00 needed. By going to a matte finish, the number of steps needed to clean the floors has been reduced by two, reducing the amount of money spent on cleaning supplies and the hours it takes to clean each week, sometimes twice and occasionally three (3) times. The committee is working to help fund the cost of replacing three (3) very old and inefficient air conditioners. Again, this would save on operational expenses.

In May of 2022, I escorted a group of members from Iowa and Nebraska on a Masonic Pilgrimage to tour the International Headquarters and other sites. We had an opportunity to witness the work of the dedicated volunteers to protect and restore this building and the artifacts for generations to come. As a result of the funds collected during our trip, some of the chairs in the State Dining Room have been restored. Much work still needs to be done so please help if you can. Contributions should be sent to the Grand Secretary's office. Please note in the memo that it is for the International Headquarters.

Sister Marion Reich, Deputy to the Most Worthy Grand Matron along with Sister Stephanie Brooks planned some amazing events for us to enjoy during the visit to Berlin.

We were greeted at the Berlin Airport by Sister Stephanie Brooks, where she presented the MWGM with a beautiful bouquet of flowers.

Also, at the airport to meet the delegation on Tuesday September 5th was Worthy Matron Sister Eka Grubert and the chapter Secretary Sister Vera Dorett-Peter. The weather was unusually warm for this season.

On Thursday Sept. 7th we were honored to visit the Reichstag (German Government Building) and the German Bundestag. We

RECOVERING A PICTURE FROM THE PAST

At their December 5, 2023 meeting, Mason City Eastern Star members were presented an Eastern Star picture, which had been restored and reframed by Christa and Ron Guthrie, chapter members.

Throughout the years, the Guthries had noticed a large Eastern Star picture hanging high on the wall in the entrance of the vault area of the Masonic Temple. This past fall Christa asked for help in getting the picture down. The Eastern Star artwork was hand painted on plastic by T. S. Hulbert in the year 1896 (11 years after Unity Chapter #58 OES Mason City was established in 1885).

Thru the years the painted plastic had warped from the sun coming thru the vault window. The picture was very dirty and the large gold Victorian gilded frame was so badly damaged, that the artwork needed to be restored and a new frame added.

Christa and Ron Guthrie felt that it was important to reframe and restore this very old painting for their chapter. Christa stated, "that this does not come close to showing how grateful we really are for our membership in Unity Chapter".

In addition, a framed document was found, which acknowledged that the chapter's petition was granted to establish Unity Chapter #58 to be held in Mason City County of Cerro Gordo on the 5th day of January in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred 85. Signed by T. R. Ercanbrack, Grand Patron, and Mary C. Agnew, Grand Matron.
