What a year we have had during this pandemic! Now that many, if not most, of our membership has received their Covid vaccine, it is time to resume normal activities! Our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Marianne Shenefelt, has rescinded her pandemic restrictions, so this letter is to notify everyone about the rescission of Iowa Grand Chapter restrictions. EFFECTIVE JULY 1st

- Chapter officers and members may sit in their stations and on the sidelines as usual.
- If you are vaccinated, you do not need to wear a mask unless you want to.

  Meals may be prepared/served/eaten at chapter meetings. (Please check with the Masons to be sure it is okay to do this.) You may have potluck meals again! You do not need to have attendance sheets signed by everyone attending the meeting.
- Chapters can resume marching in with the march.
- Chapters may resume singing during meetings Presenting may return to normal.
- Initiation may resume and remember when initiating, if you have only 1 candidate you will need to have a courtesy candidate walk with the initiate. Otherwise, you will initiate at lea 2 candidates at a time up to 4 candidates at a time.

One thing that will not change, if you are not feeling well OR if you have been exposed to someone who has a confirmed case of Covid please stay home and take care of yourself. We still need to take

Please be kind to anyone who chooses to still wear a mask or may not be comfortable with shaking hands or giving/receiving hugs. Also, remember that some members may need encouragement to return to chapter meetings or activities since they have not been anywhere in the last year.

The Eighty-fourth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Iowa was held in Cedar Rapids with head-quarters at the Hotel Roosevelt and the session being held in the Memorial Coliseum on October 24, 25, and 26, 1961. Sister Eva Lu Murrison of Purity Chapter, Wilton Junction, and Brother Edward Yelick of East Gate Chapter, Des Moines, presided as Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron. (Note: The Hotel Roosevelt opened in 1927 and was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1991. The building is now known as the Roosevelt Apartments.)

With the motto of "Rejoice in Song; be Constant in Prayer; Abide in Truth," Eva Lu entered into the duties of Worthy Grand Matron and planned for her "Happiness Session" of Grand Chapter. "As we look into the face of the future, we realize that the strength and welfare of our Order lie not in the hands of a few, but in the hearts and minds of all of us working together in the spirit of Harmony, Courage and Reverence."

On Monday evening prior to the opening of Grand Chapter, the "Highway of Happiness" banquet was held honoring Iowa's General Grand Chapter Officers and Committee Members. This was followed by the "Stars of Harmony" party at the Consistory building which included a Grand March and dancing in the ballroom to the music of "The Tune Toppers."

The Informal opening was called to order on Tuesday evening by Nell Bonnell and Edward Squire (Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron of 1954). The Grand Pages, attired in aqua formals, and Grand Ushers, wearing yellow formals, performed an impressive drill which consisted of eight different figures and seven songs.

In her Invocation, Lillian Ritter (Past Grand Matron of 1945) said: "O God, in this perilous midst of guided missiles, nuclear power and weapons of deadly warfare, we pray for our President of the United States. Wilt thou bless and sustain him and all others associated with him in high places of authority and responsibility. May the spirit of wisdom, goodness and truth rule their hearts, that law and order, justice and peace shall prevail." (Note: Bay of Pigs Invasion, April 1961; Cuban Missile Crisis, October 1962.)

The formal opening of Grand Chapter followed with the Grand Officers entering the Chapter room. The Sisters were attired in gowns of white lace trimmed with pearls and "cabbage roses" above a full gathered skirt with a scalloped hemline.

Each of the Sisters wore pearl earrings, a gift from the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, and each wore a beautiful yellow orchid of the tropical variety.

Hugh J. Tamisiea (Missouri Valley; Worthy Grand Patron of 1945) opened his address by stating: "In slightly more than two weeks, my term of office as Most Worthy Grand Patron of the General Grand Chapter will terminate... It has been an inspiring and rewarding experience, and I sincerely trust that I have done nothing to bring any discredit upon this, my own Grand Chapter."

The Wednesday morning session began with the Report of the Worthy Grand Matron. Sister Eva Lu began with the following words: "For every good thing there is a beginning and an ending. Just one year ago I beheld a highway of service and happiness. Today I am nearing the close of my journey with its harvest of love and friendship and a realization that many good deeds have been accomplished."

Instead of Watchwords for the year, Eva Lu chose the "Keywords" of Harmony, Courage and Reverence. "May we remember to raise our voices in songs of gratitude for 'Happy is he who daily lifts his heart to God in thankful praise.' Prayer is an attitude of earnest seeking after God... Truth lies in character, for truth is a thing not of words, but of life and being. Truth is beautiful."

Eva Lu made special note of the gavel and Bible she was using during the Session. "The beautiful lucite gavel, which was presented to me by the Rainbow Assembly of Wilton Junction, has travelled with me throughout the state. Each Worthy Matron where I have visited has had the privilege of using it as she presided. Within the head of the gavel are placed the seven colors of the Rainbow and my Past Grand Chaplain's pin. Placed upon the altar is the beautiful Bible which was presented to me by the Officers of Purity Chapter. The open Holy Bible is the living heart of our Order, and may it be our light to guide us into a Harmony of Truth and Love."

The "Sheaves of Love" project encouraged donations for the Home at Boone to complete the decorating and furnishing of the dining room. It also encouraged Chapters to remember those who are in the autumn of their years by doing something for the nursing homes in their community.

"Gems for His Kingdom" was special project for ESTARL. As a tribute to Brother Hugh J. Tamisiea, the project asked that each member contribute three dimes for each year of the 1958-1961 General Grand Chapter Triennium. The report indicated that a total of \$18,407.05 was received for ESTARL and 38 grants had been given. "Seven of the students are women and 31 are men. Of this number, 27 are preparing for the ministry. The other 11 are entering the fields of church music, religious education and missions."

Eva Lu's travels took her across the state many, many times during her year. Her schedule indicates that she made 160 Official Visits which included receptions for the Grand Officers, 52 afternoon Schools and evening Inspection meetings, 58 additional Chapter visitations, 3 District meetings and 6 Exemplification of the Degrees by the Grand Officers. The Worthy Grand Patron had 114 meetings listed on his itinerary. While the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron were both in attendance at many of the meetings, it was not uncommon for them to attend separate events.

Many Chapters were celebrating special anniversary milestones in 1961. Eleven chapters were instituted in 1911 (50th year); nineteen chapters in 1901 (60th year); fifteen chapters in 1891 (70th year); and three chapters were celebrating their 80th anniversary: Orient Chapter, Manchester; Mount Moriah Chapter, Anamosa and Elmira Chapter, Keokuk.

The Worthy Grand Matron granted permission to 19 Chapters to move their charters. A few of the more interesting moves were made for the following reasons: Emmet Chapter, Armstrong, to temporary quarters in IOOF Hall until the new Masonic Temple is built; Clinton Chapter to Kirk House at the First Presbyterian Church for Installation of Officers; Prairie Chapter, New Sharon, to temporary quarters until Chapter room is repaired due to fire; Council Bluffs Chapter to move the charter from the Masonic Temple building at 4th and Broadway to the new Masonic Temple at 6th and Willow, and to Magi Chapter, Boone, to the Eastern Star Masonic Home for a special meeting.

### A Travelogue from our Fraternal Correspondent



Sister Candace Martin and Brother Harold Terry served as Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron for the 144th session of the Nebraska Grand Chapter held in May of 2019. The "Legacy of Service" Session was held for 3 days mid-week in Kearny. The Worthy Grand Matron's and Worthy Grand Patron's motto for the year was: "The high road to service is traveled with integrity, compassion, and understanding." The aim was "To promote the feelings of joy and commitment through serving others." Royal purple and royal blue were their colors. These were featured throughout their grand chapter celebrations, as were candy and cars, their fun symbols. A special banner was made that traveled with the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron as they attended the various visitations. This was hung at the entrance of the Grand Chapter Room as their way for members to be present with them in spirit when they couldn't be there in person.

The Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron attended. Those presented included present and past Shrine Potentates. The Grand Marshal's duties included writing and presenting the traditional flag tributes which began with instruction in flag protocol. It included a tribute to the Filipino flag and the POW/MIA flag. There was a Grand Chapter Presentation by the Masonic Youth Leaders of Nebraska that included information about their projects and plans for the year.

The Special Project selected by the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron was **Food Bank for the Heart-lands' Backpack Program**. Through general contributions of their members and from the sales of candy and bookmarks during their area visitations, they were able to donate **\$11,895.73**. They were very pleased to help provide weekend meals for school-age children. It is also good to note that the Masonic Eastern Star Home for Children First in Fremont is doing well with a very active 4-H Club for the children.

The "Good and Plenty" Membership Banquet was attended by 396 guests. There were luncheons for Secretaries and Treasurers, and a banquet to honor the Worthy Matrons, Worthy Patrons, Associate Matrons, Associate Patrons, Conductresses and Associate Conductresses of the Subordinate Chapters.

Nebraska had just over 5,400 members in 71 Chapters. In the past, voting at Grand Chapter was limited to Past Matrons and Past Patrons, but at this Grand Chapter it was voted to include all members; however, they had proxy voting which allowed some people to cast up to 5 votes on 1 ballot. Irregularities reported included having more than 1 open Ritual in the Chapter room. They did not exemplify the Degrees during the year.



With a Grand Session filled with candy and antique cars, and members assembling early for a sing-along before the start of an afternoon session, it is very easy to see why Nebraska has a reputation as a fun Grand Jurisdiction to visit. We all look forward to being able to visit Nebraska's Grand Sessions in person in the future.

When life knocks you down, roll over and look at the stars.


Our O.E.S. Ritual tells us that "Truth never changes." In Psalm 102:27, we read: "But you are the same, and your years will have no end." (NKJV)



There were 467 Chapters in the state on January 1, 1961, with a membership of 84,295. This was a loss of 1,640 members from the previous year. Union Park Chapter No. 555, Des Moines, was constituted on December 5, 1960 and Camanche Chapter (No. 556), Camanche, was instituted on July 13, 1961. (Note: This was the last Chapter instituted in the State of Iowa.) One Chapter, Lake Mills Chapter No. 452, surrendered their charter during the year.



As I read through the list of Worthy Matrons, Worthy Patrons, Chapter Secretaries and others mentioned throughout the proceedings, I see familiar names of many and recall those I met on my Eastern Star journey. Many have passed away and faded from my sight, but they were all willing helpers in the service of humanity.

The "Dawn of Hope" Memorial Service included the following words: "It is with saddened hearts we do acknowledge the loss of many members who have climbed the hills to eternal rest." Eva Lu Murrison passed away on January 15, 2015 at the age of 98, and Edward Yelick passed away November 6, 1966, at the age of 57.
