LITTLE FREE LIBRARIES

Those who register their libraries are given a plaque with a number and are listed on the Little Free Library website making them easier to find. You don't have to register your library, but if you do your location will be added to the website. So far, we've placed books in Algona, Glidden, Vinton, Anamosa, Hiawatha, Marion, Shellsburg, Oelwein and Independence. We've found 25 Libraries and donated 340 books as of May 16th. 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Our Ritual's Relevancy vs. Marketing Our Order

Have you ever seen an Eastern Star Ritual carved in stone? Neither have I.

At some point, every Masonic organization purports that our principals and beliefs are written in stone, while our rules and regulations are not. (Speaking metaphorically, of course.)

As I was recently sorting through boxes and tote bins (trying to downsize, and not always successfully), I ran across some old mail and publications my dad had saved. What caught my eye were some Scottish Rite Journals from 1994 and 1995. Those issues spoke to the argument that Masonic organizations are no longer relevant to society and how "there just isn't time for Ritual in the world today."

The author of the article, "Reality and Ritual", noted that "...Ritual, in one form or another, is central to our lives." Getting out of bed in the morning leads to a ritual to prepare for the day. Paying bills is a form of ritual—although electronic banking has ramped up the glamour of the process. Going to work—yes, there's another example of ritual; hanging up the coat, turning on the computer, getting a caffeinated beverage before sitting down at the desk. Birthdays have rituals. Holidays have rituals. Rituals shape our lives and give meaning to our days. And when individuals organize around the enjoyment of a particular activity or purpose, a strong bond is formed and shared. Rituals give us the sense of "connectedness" with our family, with our friends, with our faith.

As Eastern Star members (as for other Masonic organizations), it is our ritualistic experience at Initiation which binds us together as a community. (No, Initiation is not intended to be an endurance test to see who is wearing the most uncomfortable shoes.)

What is it, then, that keeps us coming back to the regular meetings when there is no Initiation? Friendships, philanthropic efforts, educational events and fun. And food. I didn't mean to forget food! I'm sure you can add to that list without much effort.

So, we've identified what makes O.E.S. a special community, and we've listed the things which hold our interest. It should be a short hop to put together a winning equation:

A (Ritual) + B (engaging, enjoyable activities) = C (Relevancy)

Winning!!! Unless we lack the ability to change...and that's a whole other issue. Related, but different. "Let us move forward, then...intent on preserving what ought to be preserved, perfecting what needs to be perfected..." The Harry Potter fans among you will recognize that as part of a quote from Dolores Umbridge. I can't quote the whole speech here, because her train of thought does go completely off the rails with that entire speech. But the message portion here works for us as we should strive to keep the best of the O.E.S. Ritual and trim the portions which do not contribute toward enhancing our fundamental tenets. We need to be willing to adapt to use society's newest tools of communication, so Masonry can lead the way toward making this a better world; starting in our homes, in our communities and in our nation.

The September 2017 issue of the "Iowa Alumni Magazine" ran a very small article announcing how the University Of Iowa Tippie College Of Business was phasing out its full-time M.B.A. program. Instead, it will "...expand graduate programs that serve working professionals. Demand has shifted heavily..." Among the changes being made were offering professional certificates and expanded online course offerings for M.B.A. studies.

The Dean of the Tippie College of Business was quoted saying: "Adapting to the market is key for growth in any organization, and we're seeing clear shifts..."

What she said! Thirty years later, we are still talking about Ritual and Reality. Change is inevitable and adapting is necessary. We can keep our Order relevant and meaningful, but it will take work, not magic wands.


Batons
