March music and notecards are all original art work by Kerri.


There will be a used Formal clothing booth at Grand Chapter as well as a table for leftover pins and whatnot. Make sure to check it out!

We finally boarded the ship—and it felt so good to settle into our rooms at last! As we set sail, we were on the lookout for whales. At one point, we think we may have spotted a pod of orcas in the distance, but it was hard to be sure. Still, the excitement of possibly seeing them definitely kicked off the cruise on a high note!









August 11th

This day was all about getting to know the ship. We explored the endless food options, checked out the entertainment, and browsed through the shops.

One of the highlights was the series of showcases focused on Alaska: everything from whales and dog sledding to wildlife spotting tips and the state's fascinating history. But wow—what a ROUGH sea day! By the end of it, we were more than ready to reach Juneau.

August 12th

We finally arrived at our first port—Juneau! Mom and I took the Goldbelt Tram up to the top of Mount Roberts, and the views from up there were absolutely breathtaking. We grabbed some delicious fish and chips at the mountaintop restaurant, then wandered around to check out the nearby trail and totem poles. It was a bit too muddy for hiking, so we passed on the trail, but still enjoyed soaking in the atmosphere. Later, we did a bit of shopping in town before heading back. Juneau was a beautiful start to our Alaskan adventures!















August 13th

We were back at sea today, but thankfully the waters were much calmer than our last sea day. This time, we were headed toward the stunning Dawes Glacier. A lot of us woke up early to stake out spots in the Crow's Nest for whale watching as we sailed through the passage.

The air was getting noticeably chillier, but even from the patio of our room, the views were incredible. Watching the glacier come into view was truly awe-inspiring. The surrounding mountains were just as breathtaking, towering around us as we made our way deeper into the fjord. It was one of those moments that really made the whole trip feel magical.











August 14th

Today we arrived in Sitka! We had booked a ghost tour of the town, which turned out to be a fascinating way to explore its Russian history. We visited a number of historical sites and learned a lot about Sitka's past—some of it spooky, some of it just really interesting.

After the tour we headed to Sitka National Historical Park to walk the totem pole trail. The scenery was absolutely stunning, with towering trees, coastal views, and beautifully carved totem poles lining the path. It was a pretty long hike, but totally worth it—and we made it all the way! This might have been my favorite part of the entire trip—there was something really special about the combination of nature, culture, and history all in one place. Also, mom can spot a cow anywhere!



























August 15th

Today we arrived in Ketchikan, and I finally got to see the show I had been looking forward to since we booked the trip: The Great Alaskan Lumberjack Show! Mom had been teasing me about it the whole time, but I was fully committed.

Was it touristy? Absolutely. Was it a shameless excuse to watch some strong, flannel-wearing lumberjacks saw and chop their way through wood? You bet. But it was genuinely a great show—fun, fast-paced, and even included a bit of lumberjack history for good measure. 10/10, no regrets. I'd totally see it again.

After the show, we strolled down historic Creek Street. It was near the end of the salmon run, but we managed to spot a few fish fighting their way upstream—and even saw a sea lion lurking nearby. Finally, some real Alaskan wildlife!





























August 16th

We arrived late in Victoria, Canada—after 9 PM—and with such a short window of time before needing to be back on board, we decided to stay on the ship. It was a bit disappointing not to explore, but we'll just have to say: *Next time, Victoria!*

August 17th

We returned to Seattle, ready to make our way home. The trip came with its fair share of travel hassles but looking back, it was all worth it.

From breathtaking glaciers to charming towns, towering forests to close (or hopeful) encounters with whales, this journey was unforgettable. If I had the money, I'd move to Alaska in a heartbeat—to be surrounded by the mountains, the orca pods, the endless trees, and the deep sense of history that runs through every part of it.



CHILDREN'S CANCER CONNECTION INFORMATIONAL MEETING HELD

Exodus Chapter #313, Exira, hosted an informal informational meeting for prospective new members at the Masonic Hall on September 19th.

After Worthy Matron Connie Esbeck welcomed our guests and members, Joan Shaffer introduced our speaker from the Children's Cancer Connection, a nonprofit organization based in Johnston, Iowa. It serves families affected by cancer that are diagnosed, treated and/or living in the State of Iowa.

Through donations from organizations such as our Grand Chapter and individual donors, CCC offers free educational resources, support outings, camp programs and other services to more than 300 families annually.

When a family signs up for CCC, they receive a Welcome Box that includes information about CCC's free services and fun items like a blanket, water bottle, distraction toy and a Louie LionHeart stuffed animal.

The CCC offers many support programs and outings such as family outings, teen hangouts and lock-ins where teens can have fun with friends. They can bring homework, play video or board games, shoot hoops, watch movies or just talk.

CCC holds a variety of camps where childhood cancer survivors and their families have a secure environment to connect, grow and create lifelong memories. Camp Heart Connection programs include camps for everyone in the family: Oncology, Sibling, Family, Day and Teen Camps.

Often times, cancer survivors come back to volunteer at the camps. Picture is Dana and Joan Shaffer driving home after an OES meeting somewhere in the state. Their conversational skit was a rendition of OES 101 to give prospective members of what Eastern Star is and some of the many things we do as an organization.
